He is also the author of *Rounding the Horn: Collected Poems* and *Singing School: The Making of a Poet*, and editor of the definitive edition of Wilfred Owen's poetry, *The Complete Poems and Fragments*; *The Penguin Book of Love Poetry*; *The Oxford Book of War Poetry*; and coeditor of *The Norton Anthology of Poetry*. Stallworthy has received a Guggenheim Fellowship and is a Fellow of the British Academy and the Royal Society of Literature.

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
